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

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JOURNEY TO MADAGASCAR

My Journey to Madagascar by Phyllis Butzen

Following the death of my father, William J. Butzen, on November 1, 2021, I wanted to enroll him in Gregorian Masses. I requested the Masses through the Missionaries of the Holy Family (MSF) in Saint Louis, Missouri. My mother, Margaret B. Butzen, who was still living at the time, received a most welcoming Gregorian Mass Card for my deceased father.

My parents' Catholic faith was of utmost importance to them. God was good to them, and they were able to provide monetary assistance to various Catholic organizations.

Knowing that building churches in poor countries is much appreciated by the people and costs much less than in the U.S., I asked the MSF Advancement Director, Maurice Prater, if there were any specific needs. I was told about the mission church in Kirano, Madagascar, that was destroyed by a cyclone. This was discussed with my mother who willingly agreed to provide monetary assistance.

Rebuilding the church began in March 2022. Pictures of the construction updates were sent to me on a regular basis, and I shared these with my Mom. She was very

happy about the whole process, and it was one of the last joys of her life. She died on June 28, 2022, before the church was completed. The mission church in Kirano was named after the patron saints of my parents: Saint William & Saint Margaret Mary Catholic Church.

I made plans to travel to Madagascar from the United States to attend the blessing of the new mission church. The celebration was scheduled for Friday, June 27, which was the Solemnity of the Sacred Heart of Jesus in 2025. This was very fitting because Saint Margaret Mary was given, in an apparition by Jesus Christ Himself, the popular devotion to His Sacred Heart. Plus, this was happening during the Jubilee Year proclaimed by Pope Francis, known as Pilgrims of Hope!

Father Francois, a Holy Family priest from Madagascar serving in Texas, made arrangements for me and my adopted son Joseph to stay in Madagascar for a month. I believe God allowed both of my parents to be present in spirit for this special occasion, and I know they will continue to intercede on behalf of the Malagasy people.

The day of the dedication was a beautiful, cool, sunny day in the mountainous area of Kirano. The church was packed with people inside and outside the church. The local archbishop was the main celebrant for the Mass,

along with over 20 concelebrating priests. It was also Father Francois' 25th anniversary of ordination to the priesthood, so the day had additional significance.

It was a joyous occasion, one not to be forgotten! Following Mass, we were invited to a delicious luncheon, and the party continued the next day with more festivities, including rice crushing, dancing, and Zebu cow catching. Finally, a cow was butchered and given to the family of Father Francois as an anniversary gift. Everyone from the village and beyond were present and participated in the joyous activities.

Christine, one of Father Francois' sisters, was responsible for

overseeing the rebuilding of the mission church in Kirano, including a school dormitory, which was also funded by my parents' estate. Bunk beds and furnishings are still needed for the schoolchildren (contact Maurice for donations!).

We had the privilege of staying several days with Christine and her family, thereby experiencing

the day-to-day life of the Malagasy people. In the villages, Sunday Mass is offered only once a month, but we had the opportunity to attend a First Communion for 55 boys and girls dressed in their Sunday best. The day before, on Saturday, there were 56 baptisms in the church!

We brought new clothing to an orphanage managed by Father Francois' brother and sister-in-law. The orphanage has approximately 100 boys and girls of all ages. The children gave us a hearty welcome, sang for us, and gave two chickens to Father Francois.

Traveling in Madagascar is slow (terrible, to be honest) because the dirt roads are in poor condition. On one occasion, we got stuck in a mudhole, but such is the life for Malagasy people. They are prepared for the worst, and hope for the best!

We also visited the shrine of two laypersons who have been beatified by the Church: Blessed Victoire Rasoamanarivo (1848 – 1894) and Blessed Lucien Botovasoa (1908 – 1947). Father Francois celebrated a Mass for us at the shrine.

Fortunately, as a bonus, we were in Madagascar for the country's 65th anniversary of independence from France, which is June 26. My son Joseph and I joined in on the celebration, which included fireworks, bands, carnival rides, and grand merriment.

The religious communities of the Missionaries of the Holy Family were most welcoming and accommodating to us. One of the MSF cultural centers for poor children entertained us with dance routines. Then, Joseph and I gave two soccer balls and two basketballs to the children. It was so rewarding to watch the children play, and even Joseph joined in the fun!

In Fianarantsoa, Father Herve taught my son Joseph how to drive a motorcycle, which was a highlight for him. The next day, Father Herve took him as a passenger on his motorcycle to the Kirano church blessing! The priests and brothers of the Madagascar Province were so warm and hospitable to us. We thank them from the depths of our hearts!

In Madagascar, small rice fields

are plentiful, which unfortunately bring the mosquitoes. People get their water from streams and rivers. Fresh drinking water is not readily available, nor is electricity and refrigeration. Outside markets are the norm, as are "peddlers." Sanitation is almost nonexistent; stray dogs and chickens are plentiful.

The Madagascar landscape varies widely, but the sunsets are beautiful! Houses vary according to the region; 1-room, 2-story, 3-story houses, made from whatever materials can be found. Some regions have more Catholic and other Christian denominations, while other areas tend to have more Muslims.

Even though the vast majority of Malagasy people are poor, they are friendly and happy because they have God in their life. As in the United States and everywhere else in the world, there is government

corruption. The rich get richer, and the poor get poorer!

In reality, the poor are actually the richer, for they have God in their lives. They are thankful for what God has given them. The happiness they have from God, no one can take from them.

As Padre Pio famously said, *“Pray, hope, and don’t worry.”* The Malagasy people are hardworking people, filled with faith, living one day at a time. Trust me when I say that we can learn more from them, then they can learn from us.

THE ANSWER TO HATE IS NOT HATE

Lived by: Charlie & Erika Kirk by J. P. Richardson

Remember Charlie Kirk? Could any American now forget him? He stood tall for values and virtues – freedom, religion, family, patriotism – that Americans once considered common sense. Many people have under-appreciated those values and under-valued those virtues. Common sense sometimes seems invisible, even vanished.

As a teenager, Charlie boldly began to exhort young Americans to revive traditional American ideals. He wanted to save traditional civilization – in a civilized way. Charlie Kirk was an Apostle of Civil Discourse.

Ironically, Charlie was savagely slain – as were Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr.; Robert F. Kennedy, Sr., and his brother John F. Kennedy; Mahatma Gandhi; and countless others who promoted peace. The Prince of Peace, Our Lord Jesus Christ, was crucified.

Like others, Charlie pictured a current cultural cold war that could flame red-hot if we fail to keep our cool. Charlie encouraged civilized debate. God wills that we love Him foremost and love each other as ourselves. Obeying God's two Great Commandments would keep us civilized.

Do you know that Kirk means "church" in Scottish? The theme-music of Charlie's show was "Scotland the Brave" on bagpipes. Charles James Kirk valued tradition. Many people, old and young, found it refreshing. It seems providential that a young man who made it his mission to revive Christianity and preserve traditional civilization should be named "Church." Charlie Church went to church.

Charlie knew that God, with God-fearing Americans, can preserve America. He envisioned a "turning point" back to common sense for the

common good. Charlie reminded me of Catholic President John F. Kennedy's rousing challenge as he closed his Inaugural Address in 1961: "...let us go forth to lead the land we love, asking His blessing and His help, but knowing that here on earth, God's work must truly be our own."

Like Jack Kennedy, Charlie Kirk encouraged Americans to practice what we preach, the motto on our money is: "In God We Trust." Trusting God includes obeying His laws.

Charlie saw that truth is timeless. He was looking both back and ahead. He was showing younger people – and reminding older people – what being a man, a husband, and a father could be. Charlie's widow, Mrs. Erika Kirk, said that Charlie's priority was to: *REVIVE THE AMERICAN FAMILY*. Charlie Kirk talked the talk and walked the walk; he did not balk.


At Charlie's memorial service, Erika revived a standard set by Jesus two millennia ago: "*My husband, Charlie. He wanted to save young men, just like the one who took his life. That young man. That young man. On the*

cross, Our Savior said, 'Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do.' That man. That young man. I forgive him. I forgive him because it was what Christ did, and it's what Charlie would do. The answer to hate is not hate. The answer we know from the Gospel is love and always love. Love for our enemies and love for those who persecute us."

Our Lord taught us to pray: "*Our Father, who art in Heaven ... Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us....*" Divine, immortal words. Let us pray The Lord's Prayer daily.

The Catholic poet Alexander Pope wrote about forgiveness in his own immortal words: "*To err is human; to forgive, divine*" (An Essay on Criticism, Part II, 1711). In Confession, God graciously grants us His forgiveness of our sins.

In 1981, Pope Saint John Paul II forgave the man who had tried to slay him with gunfire in Saint Peter's Square. Forty-four (44) years later, Mrs. Erika Kirk publicly forgave her husband's killer.

Mrs. Kirk, like Charlie, encourages us to be disciples of Jesus. In her public statements following Charlie's assassination, she reflected the holy light of Holy Mary, the Mother of Jesus. Amidst the raging sea of toxic feminism engulfing us – angry, selfish, unjust, and poisonous to the common good – Erika floated like a life-preserver, a model of true Christian feminism: God-fearing, life-nurturing, always pointing to Our Savior. She was a lighthouse signaling safe harbor beyond dark, stormy waves. Her challenge to men who would be husbands: "*Be a leader worth following!*" Her challenge to women: "*Be virtuous!*" Like Mary, Erika tells us: Do whatever He tells you.

Charlie, a Protestant, surprised many people by offering Mary as the ideal of womanhood. In a podcast, he said that Protestants have under-appreciated Mary: "*I believe one of the ways that we fix toxic feminism in America is – Mary is the solution.*" Charlie might

have been influenced by Erika, a Catholic at Baptism.

Charlie Kirk's memorial tribute reached from Arizona around the globe. People spanning the spectrum of opinion have called Charlie a hero or a villain, a martyr or a political propagandist, unifying or dividing, realistic or quixotic. "Charlie Church" may be remembered mythically, along with other legendary All-American heroes and heroines: Christopher Columbus, Squanto, Yankee Doodle, Pocahontas, Uncle Sam, Paul Revere, Betsy Ross, Molly Pitcher, Johnny Appleseed, John Brown, Harriet Tubman, Casey Jones, Jack Armstrong, and the original Superman – whose motto was "Truth, Justice, and the American Way" – among others.

Have you seen the movie *Meet John Doe*? It's an American classic. John Doe re-sparks American greatness

when people need hope. Millions come to admire John, and they start “John Doe” clubs across the land to re-kindle religious and civic virtues that had made America “our home, sweet home.”

Sound familiar? Inspired young people today are joining or starting chapters of the organization that Charlie Kirk founded and Erika now carries on: Turning Point USA.

Charlie told an interviewer: “*I want to be remembered for courage for my faith. The most important thing is my faith.*” Love of God, love of family, love of neighbor, and love of country – All-American virtues that made America “bright with freedom’s holy light, protect[ed] by Thy might, great God our King,” as Baptist minister Samuel Francis Smith wrote to close

his anthem America (*My Country 'Tis of Thee*). Thank you, Charlie and Erika Kirk, for reminding us, and God bless your Family. **+jmj+**





Mr. Alvaro Interiano is a fascinating and popular YouTube personality, and he is the creator of the Uniquely Mary YouTube Channel. He is a licensed professional counselor with a Master of Divinity degree. His videos about our Roman Catholic

Faith are diverse, but the primary emphasis is about praying for the +Souls in Purgatory.

Following is his example of how to pray for the +Souls in Purgatory using the traditional Rosary Mysteries, but with purgatorial meditations on the purification needed for common sins. You are encouraged to use his meditations, or to create your own, but the point to remember is to never forget the people in Purgatory who are undergoing their final purification.

Praying for the Dead is a Spiritual Work of Mercy! For reference, see 2 Maccabees 12:38-46, Hebrews 12, and 2 Timothy 1:16-18.

Joyful Mysteries for the +Souls in Purgatory

1. Annunciation: those who often refused to do God's will in their lives.
2. Visitation: those who resisted charity for neighbors, including strangers.
3. Nativity: those who had or encouraged abortions.
4. Presentation: those who failed to raise their children in the Faith.
5. Finding in the Temple: those who put family first and God second.

Luminous Mysteries for the +Souls in Purgatory

1. Baptism: those who failed to baptize their children.
2. Wedding Feast: those who sinned against marriage vows by acts of infidelity.
3. Proclamation & Conversion: clergy who failed to properly teach the Faith.
4. Transfiguration: those who willfully rejected Christ's divinity.
5. Institution of Eucharist: those who received the Eucharist in a state of mortal sin (for reference, see 1 Corinthians 11:23-32).

Sorrowful Mysteries for the +Souls in Purgatory

1. Agony: those who were called to greater holiness but refused.
2. Scourging: those who sinned through fornication, adultery, and lust.
3. Crowning: those who sinned by their immoral thoughts.
4. Carrying the Cross: those who willfully ran from the crosses God sent them.
5. Crucifixion: Clergy who refused to lay down their lives for their sheep.

Glorious Mysteries for the +Souls in Purgatory

1. Resurrection: those who reject the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead.
2. Ascension: those who had little desire for Heaven.
3. Descent of Holy Spirit: those who denied the inspirations of the Holy Spirit to do good.
4. Assumption: those who had little love for Our Blessed Mother (especially Catholics!).
5. Crowning: those who denied Our Lady's role as Queen Mother in salvation history.



- 2 **Recite the Our Father.**
- 3 **Recite three Hail Marys.**
- 4 **Recite the Glory Be.**
- 5 **Announce the first mystery and recite the Our Father.**
- 6 **Recite ten Hail Marys.**
- 7 **Recite the Glory Be and the Fatima Prayer.**
- 8 **Announce the second mystery. Recite the Our Father and repeat the steps throughout the Rosary.**
- 9 **After completing the mysteries, recite the Hail Holy Queen & end with the Sign of the Cross.**



One hundred thirty (130!) years ago, on Saturday, September 28, 1895, two events happened simultaneously on the same day. In Saint Louis, Missouri, on the feast day of Saint Wenceslaus (which is September 28), Saint Wenceslaus Parish was founded. On the same day, in the same year, in Grave, Holland, the Missionaries of the Holy Family were founded by Venerable Father John Baptist Berthier.

Saint Wenceslaus Parish and the Missionaries of the Holy Family would eventually celebrate their anniversaries together because Archbishop Joseph Ritter of Saint

Louis gave the parish to the care of the Holy Family Fathers on December 28, 1960.

The 100th anniversary started with a yearlong, centennial celebration on September 28, 1994. Different events were held throughout the year. The yearlong festivities concluded with Archbishop Justin Rigali celebrating Mass on October 1, 1995.

The next milestone anniversary would be the 125th in 2020, but Coronavirus changed everything! For a time, public religious services were placed on hold by Archbishop Robert Carlson.

Eventually, at the weekend Masses on November 25 and 26, 2021, the delayed and much smaller celebration took place. Auxiliary Bishop Mark Rivotuso, who is a "son" of Saint Wenceslaus Church & School, celebrated the 10:00 a.m. Sunday Mass.

Not giving up, it was decided to have a big celebration for the 130th anniversary, September 28, 2025, and the feast day of Saint Wenceslaus fell perfectly on a Sunday! The main celebrant for the bilingual Mass at 12:00 noon was Archbishop Mitchell Rozanski, with Very Reverend Philip Sosa, M.S.F. concelebrating. A luncheon was served in the school gym afterwards.

Saint Wenceslaus Parish

The Bohemian congregation at Saint John Nepomuk Parish in Saint Louis, Missouri, in the

late 1880s and early 1890s, was growing. The pastor, Father John Hessoun, was looking for a location to build a second Czech church. He purchased a lot at McNair and Pestalozzi Streets but later sold it. He then bought the land between Crittenden and Arsenal and sold plots of land on Texas, Ohio, Iowa, California, and Oregon Streets. The profit from the sale of plots was used to build the first Saint Wenceslaus Church.

The first church was constructed of brick. Work began in October 1894, and the cornerstone was put in place on December 9, 1894. The church was completed in May 1895 and blessed and dedicated on July 21, 1895. The basement was used for meetings and church functions, the first floor was a school, and the second floor was the church.

The parish school opened on September 3, 1895, with 76 students and two Notre Dame nuns as teachers. On May 27, 1895, a tornado struck but only did minor damage to the church. The steeple was damaged, and some fences needed to be repaired.

On August 21, 1898, the church rectory was dedicated. It was constructed from brick and is still in use today. On June 11, 1915, a former Saint Wenceslaus school student, William Hamtil, was ordained a priest and celebrated his first Mass in the church on June 13, 1915. He would later become pastor of the parish on June 11, 1922.

On August 7, 1925, ground was broken for the construction of a new church. It was built on the corner of Oregon and Crittenden next to the rectory. The cornerstone was laid on October 11, 1925, and the new church was dedicated on May 31, 1926,

by Most Reverend Archbishop John Glennon of Saint Louis. The church was a gothic structure designed by architects O'Meara & Hills of Saint Louis at a cost of \$125,000.00.

School enrollment continued to grow and on January 5, 1936, Father William Hamtil announced the construction of a new school. Construction began on May 13, 1936. On October 18, 1936, the school was completed and dedicated by Archbishop John Glennon. The architects again were O'Meara & Hills.

On May 4, 1939, a new sacristy was planned for the church, and it was completed on June 4, 1939. Eventually, the sacristy in the church was turned into a chapel.

Missionaries of the Holy Family (M.S.F.)

In 1945, Father Joseph Pelley, M.S.F. began helping the pastor, Father Hamtil, with the celebration of weekend Masses, hearing Confessions, and visiting the sick. Father Pelley assisted Father Hamtil at Saint Wenceslaus Church until 1957. Father Pelley then became the provincial superior of his religious community.

Father William Hamtil passed away on December 10, 1960, and Father Joseph Pelley was named administrator of the parish.

Archbishop Ritter then officially assigned the Missionaries of the Holy Family to take the care of the parish on December 28, 1960, with Father Herman Berg, M.S.F. as the pastor.

On March 9, 1999, the archdiocese gave permission to add a parish center between the church and the rectory, and it was completed on January 31, 2001.

Saint Wenceslaus School experienced many changes over time! In 2003, the school was renamed Saint Frances Cabrini Academy, and it became a consolidated school for six parishes for children from kindergarten to eighth grade.

To increase attendance at the weekend Masses, and to accommodate a growing Hispanic pop-

ulation, Father Philip Sosa (who is also the provincial superior of his religious community) initiated a 12:00 noon Spanish Mass on Sunday, April 7, 2019. The Mass was a huge success, and the number of people attending the Spanish Mass is now three times the size of the two English Masses combined!

Saint Wenceslaus Parish and the Missionaries of the Holy Family will continue to celebrate together. The religious congregation has offices on the second floor of the rectory, which also serves as a residence for missionary priests who come from other countries to stay during their transition to other parishes served by the Holy Family Fathers. God willing, we hope to have this united mission for many years to come! God bless your Family. **+jmj+**
